Olinda Silvano


Peru, 1969

Olinda Reshinjabe Silvano is an Indigenous Shipibo-Konibo artist, utilizing traditional art of kené in her creative practice. Kene lines are not mere abstract geometric graphics; they are the materialization language.

In 2024 Olinda developed a mural at the IDB Cultural Center in Washington DC and she has recently exhibited her work in the 'Arts of Resistance' exhibition at the Museum of Anthropology of the University of British Columbia in Canada.

Natalia Revilla



Mapacho, 2024 Embossing and watercolor on paper 15.7 x 11.8 inches | 40 x 30 cm. Framed











Ana De Orbegoso

Her artistic practice explores gender and identity aspects by re-singnifying objects and symbols of historic iconography to create an intimate bond with the spectator, projected in photographs, multimedia productions, textile art and installations. In 2023 Orbegoso held an individual exhibition at the Peruvian Embassy in Washington DC. Her work is in the collection of the National Museum of Women in the Arts in Washington DC; Fine Arts Museum of Houston; Walters Museum in Baltimore; Art Institute of Chicago; Lehigh University, Pennsylvania; MALI Museum of Art of Lima; among other collections.


Reymond Romero


Venezuela, 1979

Super Power Girl, 2022 Textile and resin 17.7 x 11.8 x 9.8 inches | 45 x 30 x 25 cm










Worm Colombia, 1987

Medellin graffiti artist with more than 16 years of experience on the streets. He has focused his career on lettering, from throw ups and block letters to wild style. Experimentation is key in Worms work, which is why he uses different techniques and formats for his art. He works with common art formats, like canvas and sculpture, but he also takes his work to transit signals, murals, prints and coloring books, in order to reach a wider audience.



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Carbonilla, 2023 Embroidery and charcoal on fabric 35.4 x 23.6 inches | 90 × 60 cm. Framed










Francisca Rojas Chile, 1985



Salustiano


Spain, 1965

The subject of Salustiano's art is invariably the portrait. Portraying his subjects often with the emotion and expression of the glance that creates a connection with the viewer.

Numerous cultural and political personalities have works by Salustiano in their collections. Among them are William Mack, president of the Guggenheim Museum Foundation in New York; Sir Niall Fitzgerald, chairman of the British Museum and president of Reuters; Mr. Guido Westerwelle, former German Foreign Minister; the Dalai Lama and Barbra Streisand, to name a few.


Francisca Rojas Chile, 1985

Rojas explores female representation in traditional Latin American crafts. In this installment, the choice of the tassel stands out as a characteristic element of the textiles, widely used to decorate woven objects, to hang in the hair or as ornament for animals, especially in Andean cultures.

In 2024 Rojas was part of the exhibition New Worlds: Women to Watch at the National Museum of Women in the Arts in Washington DC and she also held a solo show at the Chilean Embassy in Washigton DC.


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Untitled, 2023 Embroidery and natural pigments on textile 51 x 56 inches | 130 x 143 cm
